

Mr. Greenhill was elected an Associate of The Institution on the 2nd May, 1865, and was subsequently placed in the class of Associate Members.

WILLIAM JOHN JENKINS, born at Llangantin, Brecon, on the 12th September, 1858, died suddenly at Retford on the 29th May, 1911. Trained at the Midland Railway Works, Derby, he was appointed in 1880 chief draughtsman to Messrs. Allchin and Company, Northampton, and a few years later he joined West's Gas Improvement Company, Manchester, in a similar capacity, later becoming manager, a position which he held for 11 years. He then founded the firm of Messrs. W. J. Jenkins and Company, Ltd., Gas Engineers, of Retford, of which he was Managing Director at the date of his death.

Mr. Jenkins was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 4th December, 1888.

JOSEPH MALCOLM KERR, born in Scotland on the 25th April, 1844, died in Ceylon on the 14th August, 1909. Educated at Owens College, Manchester, he was trained as a mechanical engineer, especially in millwork, and occupied responsible positions in several Lancashire mills. In 1885 he was appointed Manager to the Gokak Water Power and Manufacturing Company, Belgaum, India, and erected, under Mr. R. B. Joyner, the mills and power-plant, the first of their kind in India, subsequently retaining sole management until 1904, and carrying out considerable extensions. He was then employed by Mr. Joyner in connection with the hydro-electric power-scheme for Bombay City, and whilst later erecting a large irrigation dam in Kolhapur his health failed.

Mr. Kerr was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 5th December, 1893.

WILLIAM ISAAC LAST,¹ born at Dorchester in 1857, died on the 7th August, 1911. Apprenticed with Messrs. Haywood, Tyler and Company, he gained the Senior Whitworth Scholarship and
