

EHRET WAY, son of the late Colonel G. A. Way, C.B., and a great-grandson of Sir William Cubitt, Past-President, was born in India in 1877, and died at Broadstairs on the 29th August, 1913. Trained on the Taff Vale Railway, he gained practical experience in the Malay States, and in 1904 became temporary Assistant in the Indian Public Works Department. He was employed successively on the Nagda-Muttra State Railway, the North Western Railway and the Great Indian Peninsula Railway at Bhusawal, where it is believed he contracted enteric fever.

Mr. Way was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 4th April, 1905.

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MAXIMILIAN RICHARD WESTERN, born on the 25th May, 1850, died in London on the 2nd October, 1913. He served his pupilage to the late Mr. William Stroudley on the Brighton Railway, and afterwards joined the firm of Powis, James and Company, Engineers, Lambeth. In 1882 he went to Rangoon, where he was engineer and manager to a trading firm and a Government inspector. Returning in 1894, he served under the Inspecting Engineer to the Egyptian and Sudan Governments until his death.

Mr. Western was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 3rd May, 1881.

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EDWARD WILLEY, B.Sc. (*Lond.*), was born on the 7th February, 1884, died at Vancouver on the 11th July, 1913. He was educated at Leeds University, and gained practical experience in the Newmarket Haigh Moor and Houghton Main Collieries. In 1907 he went to India, and was engaged in the management of manganese mines and a railway in Mysore. Proceeding to Canada in 1912, he was employed at the time of his death on the staff of the Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir), Limited, at Vancouver Island.

Mr. Willey was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 7th December, 1909.

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
