

HUGH BATESON, born on the 20th June, 1870, died in London on the 14th March, 1914. Trained in the Locomotive Works at Crewe, and as a private pupil of the late Mr. F. W. Webb, he afterwards served on the London and North Western staff until 1895, when he obtained an appointment as Assistant Engineer on the Assam Bengal Railway. Subsequently he was employed as Executive Engineer on railway and bridge construction in the Punjab until his death.

Mr. Bateson was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 3rd December, 1895.

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ALBERT WILLIAM CRAVEN, born in Yorkshire in 1855, died at Melbourne, Victoria, on the 28th November, 1913. Trained under Mr. J. B. Henderson, M. Inst. C.E., he afterwards engaged in consulting practice, in the course of which he carried out a number of surveys in difficult country, as well as mine-surveys and other work. He was for 24 years a member of the Victorian Legislative Assembly, and also for several years Chairman of the Standing Committee on Railways.

Mr. Craven was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 3rd March, 1891.

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JOHN WILDING DAWSON, born on the 4th January, 1866, died in Mauritius on the 18th January, 1914. Trained under Mr. John Stevenson, of Barrow, he subsequently carried out building and railway work in British Columbia, and in 1894 he obtained an appointment as Resident Engineer on sewerage works at Port Louis, Mauritius. In 1904 he was appointed Assistant Director of Public Works and Surveys, and held this post at the time of his death.

Mr. Dawson was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 4th December, 1906.

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ARTHUR FRANCIS EVES, M.A., M.A.I. (*Dubl.*), born on the 20th May, 1876, died at Cawnpore, India, on the 25th October, 1913. On leaving Trinity College, Dublin, he served a pupilage to Messrs.

Fisher and Le Fanu, Belfast, and to Messrs. Dick, Kerr and Company, London, for whom he subsequently acted as engineer on several tramway contracts. In 1906 he obtained an appointment with the East Indian Railway Company, which he retained until his death.

Mr. Eves was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 7th April, 1903.

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SACKVILLE FISHER, born in 1859, died in Westminster on the 13th November, 1913. He served a pupilage to the late Mr. F. G. Slessor on the Cape Government Railways, and was afterwards on the contractors' staff of the Severn Tunnel works. Returning to Cape Colony in 1881, he was employed on the railways until 1884, after which he was engaged on the Manchester Ship Canal works, as an engineer on Messrs. Walker's staff, until 1890. Shortly afterwards his health broke down, and he retired from professional life.

Mr. Fisher was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 1st December, 1885.

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JOHN-BAPTIST ROBERT GREEN, born on the 16th October, 1887, lost his life by drowning at Wadi Halfa, Sudan, on the 1st November, 1913. He was trained in the locomotive department of the London and North Western Railway at Crewe, and at the Great Northern works, Doncaster. At the time of his death he occupied the position of district locomotive superintendent on the Sudan Government railways.

Mr. Green was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 4th February, 1913.

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EDWARD HODGSON, born on the 10th July, 1854, died at Sunderland on the 5th May, 1913. After serving a pupilage under Messrs. Joseph Potts and Son, of that city, he entered the service of the Sunderland Corporation as an assistant in the Engineer's department. At the time of his death he was acting as Deputy Borough Engineer, under Mr. J. W. Moncur, M. Inst. C.E., and
