

their service until 1915, when he became Resident Engineer on the Tanjong Pagar Dock works at Singapore. He was elected an Associate Member on the 3rd March, 1885, and was transferred to the class of Members on the 16th December, 1902.

THEOPHILUS MICHELL, born on the 13th March, 1852, died at Bournemouth on the 15th February, 1916. In 1875, after passing through Coopers Hill College and securing practical experience on the Great Western Railway, he was appointed to the Indian Public Works Department, and was posted to the Railway Branch, in which he served until 1898, when he was appointed to the South India Railway. He became Chief Engineer in 1905, and retired in the following year, returning home to reside at Bournemouth. Mr. Michell was elected an Associate Member on the 4th May, 1880, and was transferred to the class of Members on the 30th January, 1900.

HUGH LEWIN MONK, born in India on the 13th November, 1844, died at Wadhurst, Kent, on the 29th July, 1916. Passing out of Roorkee College, he entered the Indian Public Works Department in 1865, serving therein until his retirement with the rank of Executive Engineer, first grade, in 1899. During that period he was engaged on the survey and construction of railways and the erection of large bridges, on the frontier and throughout India and Burma. He was elected an Associate on the 7th December, 1875, subsequently became an Associate Member, and was transferred to the class of Members on the 11th November, 1890.

JOHN DUNLOP PARKER, born on the 9th March, 1844, died at Glasgow on the 5th May, 1916. In 1862 he entered the service of the North British Railway Company, and 9 years later joined the staff of the Clyde Trust, carrying out, during 12 years' service, important dock extensions and other works, as Resident Engineer and Manager. In 1883 he joined the late Sir William Robertson Copland, M. Inst. C.E., and was associated with many of the water-supply, drainage and other undertakings carried out by him. After Sir William Copland's death Mr. Parker carried on an extensive practice in Glasgow with his son, Mr. W. A. Parker, M. Inst. C.E., and the late Captain P. I. Whitton. Mr. Parker was elected a Member on the 2nd March, 1886.

THOMAS RICHARDS, born at Tavistock in 1844, died at Portishead on the 28th March, 1916. Trained under his father as a mining engineer, he went out in 1868 to Chili, where for 18 years he had charge of copper mines and smelting works, surveys and railway construction. Subsequently he spent several years in Venezuela, the United States and Mexico, in connection with gold and silver mining properties and similar work. In 1894 he was appointed Superintendent of Nundydroog Mines on the Kolar Goldfield, India, retiring in 1910. Mr. Richards was elected a Member on the 11th January, 1887.
