

port works at Galvan, Bahia Blanca.<sup>1</sup> Mr. Trery was elected an Associate Member on the 6th December, 1887, and was transferred to the class of Members on the 8th November, 1892.

WILLIAM BARROW TURNER, born 29th August, 1840, at Grange, Lancashire, died at Ponsonby Hall, Cumberland, 23rd October, 1916. Having served his pupilage from 1856 to 1860 under Mr. Edward Wadham, M. Inst. C.E., he was then made Assistant, and in 1864 became a partner in the firm. He became managing partner of one of the largest hæmatite mines in Cumberland and a director of the Furness Railway Company, the Cleator and Workington Railway Company, and the Beckermest Mining Company. He was elected an Associate Member 15th May, 1866, and transferred to the class of Members 16th January, 1877.

EDGEWORTH RICHARD USSHER, born in Canada on the 15th June, 1839, died at Dunedin, New Zealand, on the 13th April, 1916. He obtained his earlier practical experience in Canada, leaving that country for New Zealand in 1863. For some years he acted as an officer of the Roads Department, and after an interval of private practice, as an assistant engineer on railway construction. In 1887 he was appointed District Engineer at Otago, and continued in this position until his retirement in 1908. He was elected a Member on the 2nd February, 1886.

JOHN WOOD, born in 1831, died 22nd December, 1916. Early in his career he worked under Sir Thomas Bouch, whose Westminster office he managed for a time. He was subsequently occupied in laying out the Cockermonth, Keswick and Penrith Railway, of which he afterwards became Engineer, as also of the Cleator and Workington Railway. He laid out that part of the Caledonian Railway between Beattock and Moffat, and had charge of the construction of a number of railway lines. He was elected a Member 5th May, 1868.

COLIN SELWYN BROWN, B.SC. (*London*), born on the 5th October, 1889, was killed in action in France on the 1st July, 1916. On completing his training and graduating, he was appointed assistant engineer on the Beira and Mashonaland and Rhodesia railways under Mr. Charles Corner, M. Inst. C.E. After the outbreak of war, he came home and obtained a commission in the Royal Engineers, proceeding to France towards the end of 1915. He was elected an Associate Member on the 12th January, 1915.

PERCY CLEMENT BURNETT, born 21st May, 1887, at Johnstone, Renfrewshire, died at Rockhampton, Queensland, 24th July, 1915. In 1910 he entered the service of the Queensland Government Railways, where he was engaged in construction work. He was
