

Scouts Association. From 1883 to 1921 he served continuously in the Volunteers and the Territorials, being gazetted Honorary Colonel in 1905. When placed on the retired list in 1921 he retained his seat on the Territorial Association. In 1937 he was appointed Deputy Lieutenant for the County Palatine of Chester. His services were recognized by the award of the Order of the Bath in the 1939 Birthday Honours.

He was married in 1892 to Miss E. M. Jameson, and is survived by his son and two daughters.

HENRY ALBERT CUTLER, who died at the age of 91 at Groomsport, County Down, on the 6th March, was born in South Hackney on the 22nd January, 1861. He was educated privately and at King's College, London, and was articled to the late A. T. Walmisley from 1879 to 1882.

For the next four years he worked as assistant to the Municipal Engineer of Barrow-in-Furness, in the drawing office and on a high-level bridge approach, the Newbarnes Valley sewer, and Roose Road. In 1886 he returned to Mr Walmisley's service as Chief Assistant in the latter's work on bridges and harbours, but three years later obtained a post as Resident Engineer in charge of the flood works and a part of the sewerage of Leicester. In 1891 he moved again, to be Borough Engineer of Rawtenstall, where he supervised the construction of tramways, and designed and built several public buildings. In 1897 he crossed to Ireland and for six years was City and Water Engineer of Cork, where he was responsible for the underpinning and restoration of the municipal buildings, the construction of tramways, and the execution of flood prevention and water filtering and pumping schemes.

In 1903 he left Cork to be City Surveyor of Belfast, where he remained until his retirement in 1926. Projects for which he was responsible at Belfast, apart from his routine work, included a drainage scheme for two districts, purification works for the sewerage for the whole city, and the installation of tramways and their power supply.

Mr Cutler was elected an Associate Member of the Institution in 1886, and transferred to full membership in 1905. He was a Member of Council from 1924 to 1927. In 1886 he was awarded a Miller Prize for a Paper read before Students of the Institution, and about that time was co-author with Edge of a book "Curve Tables."
